If a verb, it means 'bring about' (e.g. He will effect changes in the running of the business).</p> <p><b>altar:</b> a table-like piece of furniture in a church. <b>alter:</b> to change.</p> <p><b>ascent:</b> the act of ascending (going up). <b>assent:</b> to agree/agreement (verb and noun).</p>	<p><b>cereal:</b> made from grain (e.g. breakfast cereal). <b>serial:</b> adjective from the noun series -a succession of things one after the other.</p> <p><b>compliment:</b> to make nice remarks about someone (verb) or the remark that is made (noun). <b>complement:</b> related to the word complete - to make something complete or more complete (e.g. her scarf complemented her outfit).</p> <p><b>descent:</b> the act of descending (going down). <b>dissent:</b> to disagree/disagreement (verb and noun).</p> <p><b>desert:</b> as a noun - a barren place. <b>dessert:</b> a sweet course after the main course of a meal.</p>	<p><b>advice:</b> noun - recommendation offered <b>advise:</b> verb - offer suggestions</p> <p><b>device:</b> noun - a thing made e.g. iphone device <b>devise:</b> verb - plan or invent something</p> <p><b>licence:</b> noun - driving license <b>license:</b> verb - you permit someone to do something</p> <p><b>practice:</b> noun - the name of the practise e.g. I am going to football practice tonight. <b>practise:</b> verb - the action of repeating something e.g. I practise my times tables.</p> <p><b>prophecy:</b> noun - a prediction <b>prophesy:</b> verb - the act of saying that</p>	<p><b>heard:</b> past tense of the verb hear. <b>herd:</b> a group of animals.</p> <p><b>led:</b> past tense of the verb lead. <b>lead:</b> present tense of that verb, or else the metal which is very heavy (as heavy as lead).</p> <p><b>morning:</b> before noon. <b>mourning:</b> grieving for someone who has died.</p> <p><b>past:</b> noun or adjective referring to a previous time (e.g. In the past) or preposition or adverb showing place (e.g. he walked past me). <b>passed:</b> past tense of the verb 'pass' (e.g. I passed him in the road).</p> <p><b>precede:</b> go in front of or before. <b>proceed:</b> go on.</p>	<p><b>profit:</b> money that is made in selling things. <b>prophet:</b> someone who foretells the future.</p> <p><b>stationary:</b> not moving. <b>stationery:</b> paper, envelopes etc.</p> <p><b>steal:</b> take something that does not belong to you. <b>steel:</b> metal.</p> <p><b>wary:</b> cautious. <b>weary:</b> tired.</p> <p><b>who's:</b> contraction of who is or who has. <b>whose:</b> belonging to someone (e.g. Whose jacket is that?).</p>	Test on all of the must know Year 6 Words.
